• Shady Creek is an amazing opportunity for community service hours, but it is also an experience for you to remember and to find more meaning in the natural world. While you are heavily discouraged from using your phone, you won't really need it, immersing yourself in the community you'll find at Shady Creek will be far more interesting than anything you can find online. It's truly an amazing experience to spend time away from home, away from school, and other stressors of life and simply allocate time to yourself.

What to expect?

Going to Shady Creek, you should expect to have an experience that is as good as you make it to be. The naturalists (faculty members who lead classes and help cabin leaders when necessary) are all very interactive and helpful people who you can talk to when in need of assistance. They are a big part of the Shady Creek experience and it's definitely valuable to go up and talk to them, so don't be afraid to! Being an outdoor school, it's obvious to expect to be mostly outdoors.
