#### From Ms. Batchelder:

Hello all! I hope that by the time you're reading this, it will finally feel like autumn, my favorite season! We've had a busy semester already. September was Suicide Awareness Month, and I provided Signs of Suicide prevention presentations in all English classes, as well as a parent/guardian presentation. Help is always available for anyone by calling or texting the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Number: 988. We had a well attended Blood Drive, sponsored by the Excel Club. Thank you to all of the students who volunteered their time, and all of the staff and students who donated! Several universities were on-campus providing informational presentations: UC Davis, Binghamton University of New York, and Yale University. Seniors also had the opportunity to learn about Yuba College programs and many universities at Yuba College's Information Day, while juniors and seniors got to visit CSU Chico. We will have an informational presentation from Sacramento State University on November 14. SENIORS who are interested in going straight to a university next year should be researching (and it's never too early to start that step for any student) and applying. I will be holding application workshops on the following days that were selected from seniors' responses to a survey sent out earlier this semester:

- 10/18, 1:00-3:00 UC Application Workshop
- 10/25, 3:00-5:00 CSU Application Workshop
- 10/30, 3:00-5:00 Personal Insight Question/Personal Statement Writing Workshop
- 11/6, 3:00-5:00 UC Application Workshop

I am happy to meet with students who need one-on-one support, as well. The deadline for submission for California State Universities (CSU) and University of California (UC) applications is November 30. It's very important that students do not wait until the last minute! JUNIORS & SOPHOMORES who chose to sign up will be taking the PSAT/NMSQT on Tuesday, October 24 or Thursday, October 26. They will be assigned to one of the two days. There is no cost to the student or family for the test; MCAA is sponsoring the test. If you would like more information, please visit collegeboard.org. I will be meeting with all seniors over the next month to be sure they know what they need to be doing, and I know how to help them do it. After the seniors, I will schedule appointments for the students in the other grades to create their academic plans for the coming years. I anticipate these will be half hour long meetings. If you would like to join your student and me for the conversation, please let me/them know and watch for more information that will be coming.

## MCAA Students Shine in *The Laramie Project*





#### MATH DEPARTMENT

The math department is continuing to plug along in all classes. 7th grade math classes are currently learning how to solve equations and inequalities. 8th grade math is beginning to graph linear equations as well as exploring the slope of lines. Integrated 1 classes are wrapping up a unit on the transformations of various function families. Integrated 2 classes are continuing their exploration of quadratic equations and their various forms while Integrated 3 classes are working on a unit which focuses on a variety of polynomial operations. If your child is struggling in their math class please advocate to them to attend our daily block 9 interventions. We are also continuing to offer after school tutoring on Monday, Tuesday and Thursdays from 3:00 - 4:00pm.

## SOCIAL SCIENCES

The seventh-grade history class has been on an exciting journey through time recently. We have just wrapped up our engaging units on the Roman and Muslim empires, delving into the fascinating history of these great civilizations. Now, their focus has shifted to the intriguing period known as the Dark Ages in medieval Europe. The students are set to explore the events that defined this era, as well as the remarkable achievements in art and literature. Adding a hands-on element to their learning, the seventh graders have just received a unique assignment - to construct a model of a European castle, partnering up with their peers and drawing inspiration from actual historic European castles. For historians, it's a fascinating aspiring investigation of history and culture.

The eighth-grade history class is in the midst of an exciting and comprehensive exploration of American history this year. They've recently concluded their units on early colonial America and the American Revolution, where students delved into the challenges faced by early American settlers and the pivotal events that paved the way for independence and the creation of the new constitution. 






## FIELD TRIPS & PHYSICS EXPLORATIONS

### ATTENDANCE NOTICE

Good attendance is extremely important for all of our students at MCAA. Here are a few friendly reminders about attendance policies at MCAA:

A minimum of 90% attendance is required for all students.

All legitimate absences must be cleared by a parent or guardian within **5 days** of the student's absence.

"Personal" will no longer be a valid reason for an excused absence. For any medical appointments, please provide a doctor's note.

## The clearances must be made in the following ways:

Telephone call from the parent/guardian to the attendance office. If a voicemail is left, please list the student's name, exact date, and reason for the absence

A note signed from the parent/guardian. No other signature is valid. The student's name, exact date of absence, and reason for absence.

Any uncleared absences will be treated as truancy.



A tardy is defined as any student not in their assigned seat in their assigned classroom when the tardy bell rings. Consequences of violations of this policy are as follows:

**5 or more tardies** = TARDY LETTER #1 = Detention or campus beautification.

**10 or more tardies** (after the first letter is given) = TARDY LETTER #2 = Detention of campus beautification.

**15 or more tardies** (after the student has earned letter #1 and #2) = TARDY LETTER #3 = In-house, or school site Saturday school.

**20 or more tardies** (after the student has earned letter #1, #2 and #3) = TARDY LETTER #4 = In-house or school site Saturday school.

**25 or more tardies** (after the student has earned letter #1, #2, #3 and #4) = TARDY LETTER #5 = 1 day suspension or District Saturday school or citation into SARB.

Students are required to attend all classes on the day of the performances, rehearsal or event.

Failure to do so will result in the student not being able to participate in the performance or event that day.
