

# What's your favorite aspect of MCAA?

"I like the rigorous aspect, also the arts of it because I believe in a wellrounded student." If you're like me, you'll know that moving into the adult world can seem extremely daunting. It's hard to know exactly where to start, but fear not — in this section of The Spotlight, I'll be showing you step-by-step approach to adulting. The topic for this issue is taxes. The word alone strikes fear into the heart of any first-time filer. Though, I think you'll be shocked at just how easy it really is. This year, I opted to use H&R Block, a simple and free website that guides you through the process.

First, go to their website and select the free version of their online tax filing service, input some of your personal information, and then enter your income information, which should be found on your W-2 form. The form contains information such as your employer's EIN, your income, and tax withheld. Some W-2s can import all this info automatically using the EIN in Box B.

After entering your income information, add any deductions you qualify for, such as student loan interest or donations, to maximize your refund. Some deductions you can look forward to in the coming years are moving expenses not reimbursed by your employer, tuition and fees, and the earned income credit which is applicable if you've worked and earned under \$59,187. You'll be able to review your federal return and see how much money you'll receive as a refund or how much you owe the IRS. Next, complete your state and local returns, which should be quick and easy as H&R Block will pull the necessary information from your federal return. Finally, you'll have the option to either send your information electronically to the government or print it off and mail it in. You can also choose whether to have your refund directly transferred or mailed to you as a check. As a first-time tax filer, I was nervous about the whole process and assumed it would be an arduous task, but thanks to H&R Block, I was pleasantly surprised at how easy and straightforward it was! Their free service was incredibly automated, which was perfect for someone like me who can be a bit lazy. Compared to tutorials for other tax software like TurboTax and TaxSlayer, H&R Block was by far the most user-friendly. Overall, I hope this article somewhat quelled your fears of filing and gave you some useful tips going forward. Happy filing!
